This was purely a Business decision to allow us to have our own identity in the Aerospace and Defence Marketplace, I believe this will be welcome for a number of reasons and

look forward to pushing on.

Where did that year go, RSC has now been in

Group for a year.

The stability of RSC was our first priority and we had to work very hard in the first few months to regain the approvals that we needed after becoming a new Company.

That done, we then had the challenge of engaging with Group on the introduction of internal work, not without its challenges!! We are now heavily involved with supporting our Sister company FGP Systems on a daily basis. Just to emphasis the length of time it takes to regain a Primes approval after a name change etc., RSC have just been awarded Leonardo Helicopters accreditation which has taken exactly 12 months, we now need to work towards building a relationship with them and hopefully attracting their supply chain to return to RSC for their Surface Treatments requirements.

May sees PRI returning to RSC to fully commission all the Treatment processes to Aerospace Approval standard (NADCAP), this will again open new income streams and allow us to full utilise the whole Plant. RSC will also be exploring the addition of new processes at its Weymouth branch to allow re-

stricting logistics on some Projects that would better suit WRSC. RSC have recruited 3 new operators to boost the treatments depart-

ment and are expecting to recruit again shortly to allow further growth.

We have seen the first orders on a possible 6 year contract for Ballistic panel painting for the Scout reconnaissance special Vehicle, and also have started colour Anodising for optical equipment for the Hollywood Film Industry.

Thales have approved us for new Masking and Treatment on another new Project which could also offer good growth prospects to RSC, so we are extremely optimistic that this will come to fruition. RSC have also embarked on a 5s programme which we will need to sustain, The workplace is our shop window and we have not had the resource previously to allow us to really address this, the nature of our processes are messy so a constant battle is needed to allow the best working environment. We are striving for World Class standards, and I am confident that RSC can continue to deliver.

Data V's **Information** and interpretation and effect to Operations here at FGP Systems

What at face value seems to equal the same thing there is a subtle difference between data and information?

Data are the facts or details from which **Information** is derived. The usefulness or relevance of individual pieces of data rarely offers value. For data to become useful information, the data needs to be put into context.

Here at FGP the systems the Management Operating Systems being introduced that extract data from multiple sources post processing and then producing data that offer clear visual understanding of:

- Customer requirements
- Performance trends
- Development opportunities
- Potential Failure Risk management
- Productivity

The data based Operating System that is active and subject to regular enhancements working across all business functions is proving to be the enabler for FGP to meet if not exceed the strategy of development and growth.

The latest addition to the SCIPE toolbox being the account management dashboard (see below)

Taking data directly from both customer reports / FGP's MRP as you can see we now have excellent information that are pulse point for Customer performance & associated revenue streams.

Clear Dynamic Customer status for the following KPI's:

- Delivery performance OTTR
- Order book change last year / current year
- Past Due status
- Must go list for day
- Ownership

in summary.....The data demonstrates how typical customer deliveries are flown down through MRP. As you can see the sheet is visually complex with no clear and obvious order status, no point of historic reference. This information is critical whilst carrying out strategic planning reviews -Sales Inventory Operations Planning (SIOP). Whilst as you can see the Information provided through SCIPE gives clarity of status, immediate alert that ensure both tactical reaction and strategic plans are put in place to protect our customers and ensure growth of business through performance levels.

Collaboration

Nigel Pitman, Managing Director of FGP Systems Ltd & RSC Ltd

Since the purchase of RSC by CIM twelve months ago we have seen close collaboration between the companies. RSC have enjoyed investment on a level never seen before in the business with the addition of Sulphuric, Passivation and Surtec 650V lines, this has enabled the company to support FGP processing requirements across its customer base. FGP customers (CurtissWright, UTAS, Safran, Zodiac) have in the past 8 months approved RSC for Chromic, Alocrom and Paint enabling the external sub-con costs incurred by FGP to be switched to RSC our internal Group solution for around 70% of FGP's requirements. Since December RSC have taken on the Zodiac Optima processing (Sulphuric Anodise) which is generating annual sales of £3.0m to FGP and £400k to RSC. In four months RSC have developed a process which has taken previous suppliers up to 12 months to achieve a level of supply but only achieving a 50% quality yield. This culminated in March where RSC processed in excess of six hundred and fifty parts enabling FGP to deliver 50 units in a single week achieving recognition from the end customer Zodiac. RSC is also developing new relationships with paint solutions on composite seat platforms in our Weymouth facility again offering a customer a new solution within group where a single cus-

tomer approval is enabling the supply of multiple processes. CIM Group also offers up fabrication capability as well, where we have seen a new market open up with Thales around supply of fabricated transportation plates, this enabler has led to City welding and fabricating the product to a very high standard which is then transported to our Weymouth facility where the final operations of painting and stencilling are completed. The units are approximately six metres long and definitely not work that could have been taken on by either FGP or RSC in their entirety. In these times of uncertainty where customers are assessing risk more stringently and the costs incurred to manage a convoluted supply chain, CIM's strategy of creating a total manufacturing solution is enabling our customers to rationalise their supply chains and offer higher levels of BOM's. This is culminating in increased levels of business to Group with the generation of new business leads due to

the quality and integrity being offered by a very capable supply chain to our customers old and new.



Drip Drip Drop Little April Projects

During the month of April City engineering systems completed a project for a specialised vacuum process contractor for an installation at a well-known Elderflower Cordial manufacturer who are based in Leicester. The project entailed 2No 3000x3000x2500 316 Stainless Steel Fusion tanks, 316 Stainless Steel access walkways, 100x100 Stainless Steel box section support gantry. The fabrication and welding was carried out at the City Engineering Cardiff workshops so as to eliminate any cross contamination that would affect the Stainless Steel sections. As all projects the time scales were tight which resulted in the personnel working over the Easter period to achieve the delivery dates.

The below project is one part of 4 sections that was completed in April for a new client, these sections once fitted out by the client make an Exhibition stand for a world famous whiskey manufacture. The Exhibition stand will then be transported around the Formula 1 Season Circuit. This project was also on a tight time scale, all delivery dates were achieved.

I would like to express my appreciation for the performance improvements you and your team at FGP Systems Limited recently implemented and sustained to better serve Honeywell Aerospace Yeovil, UK site.

In October last year, we initiated the monthly supply reviews with the objectives to review FGP Systems Limited performance metrics, devise a recovery plan, discuss and prioritize improvement activities, review business and engineering developments as well as track progress. These productive monthly supply results have been yielding positive results and will be continued in 2017.

Over the past few months, I have been closely monitoring the progress of your recovery plan. Amongst your recent achievements, I would like to highlight the following ones:

- Your delivery performance has increased by 21% from October to December 2016, going from 73% to sustained 94%.
- Backlog levels have been reduced by more than 75%, equivalent to a past due decrease of almost 150,000 USD. Since the beginning of this year, the past due value has been regularly under 50,000 USD.
- Excellent quality performance with one single PPM (parts per million) disruption over more than 17,000 receipts in 2016, with no impact to Honeywell Aerospace Yeovil performance.
- Great collaboration between Honeywell Aerospace Go Team and FGP Systems Limited to successfully fix issues on eleven key parts. More specifically, I would like to recognize the excellent collaboration between our teams to improve and fix two key designs for complex treatment process.

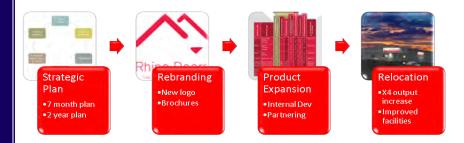

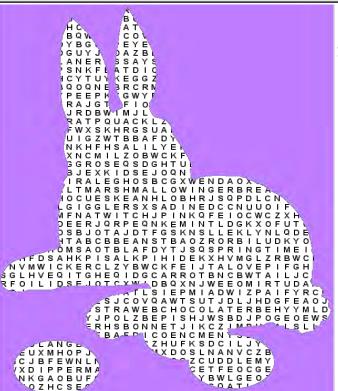
